MESSAGE FROM OUR NON-EXECUTIVE PRESIDENT & CEO

As we write these lines and take time to reflect on the last 12 months, we find ourselves filled with gratitude and pride. Gratitude because, as an organization, we continue to have remarkable partners that reinforce our capacity to deliver on our mission. Pride because, no matter the circumstances, our team repeatedly goes beyond to ensure the Digicel Foundation achieves its objectives.



Digicel Fondation



This year the Foundation invested US\$3.47M, primarily in its four flagship programs, only wavering when Haiti faced unexpected challenges such as Covid-19 and natural disasters.

Our construction program ended the financial year with a total of 188 schools built across Haiti; a number reached following the inauguration of three new projects in the North, West, and Northeast departments. Furthermore, following the 7.2 magnitude earthquake on August 14, our engineers evaluated the 23 schools built by the Digicel Foundation in the affected areas to address any required repairs. Having witnessed the earthquake's devastating impact on other educational infrastructure, the Digicel Foundation manifested its support by making a US\$1M commitment toward school reconstruction. Following a call for applications, the Foundation's project approval committee completed an extensive review of the submissions selecting three schools and identifying other strong candidates for future construction.

Because people are at the heart of education, our professional development team was delighted to sponsor the national teacher of the year program PWONA (Pwofese Nasyonal Ane a). In its second edition, this initiative, spearheaded by our partner P4H, serves to recognize excellence and highlight the significant contributions of Haitian teachers to the country's development. Additionally, the Digicel Foundation continued collaborating with the Ministry of Education to implement its Support Project for Capacity Building of School Communities for Quality Education (PARCCSEQ). Launched in 2019, this project encourages the direct involvement of communities in their schools' management to promote quality education and sustainability. After a challenging two years due to social unrest and the pandemic, the 68 participating schools made great strides. Sixty-seven schools set up participatory structures, and 57 received financing to start a social enterprise to assist with budgetary needs.

Our signature grants campaign, Konbit Pou Chanjman, has become a renowned mechanism for leaders to support growth in their communities. The fifth edition was overwhelmingly successful, with an 87% increase in applications year on year. Though the campaign only promoted 15 grants, the Konbit Pou Chanman jury decided to finance an additional seven, specifically for finalist organizations operating in the earthquake-impacted areas. In parallel, our field visits have shown us that the 17 Konbit Pou Chanjman projects funded in 2021 are starting to bear fruit, improving the lives of many.

Staff engagement activities were decentralized this year, allowing Digicel employees from all regions to make a difference in their community. Positive feedback received from participants led to the organization of more than 20 volunteer days that included mobile clinics, public square rehabilitations, tidy towns, reforestation efforts, etc. We are thankful for the outstanding support shown by Digicel staff and look forward to sharing more meaningful moments in the future.

March 7, 2022 marked the beginning of the Digicel Foundation's 15th anniversary in Haiti. Fifteen years of continuous ENGAGEMENT alongside the Haitian people thanks to the support of so many: our Patron, Denis O'Brien, our Global Chairperson, Maria Mulcahy, our board members, our staff, our partner institutions, and of course, our Digicel customers whose loyalty helps make our work possible. Together, we will make this fifteenth anniversary year even more exceptional!

OUR SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

t the beginning of each fiscal year, the Foundation team selects new school construction projects and plans their execution. For 2022, this meant choosing three projects and completing the two already underway: Ecole Nationale de Camp Coq and Institution Mixte Notre Dame de l'Assomption.

After reviewing dozens of construction requests, Foundation staff conducted technical site surveys at 26 of the applying schools. Centre Éducatif Congréganiste Mon Foyer de Carice was the first project to meet all of the Foundation's selection criteria and the first to be approved.

Thereafter, August 14, 2021, was the driving force behind the Foundation's decisions concerning its future constructions. Indeed, at 8:29 AM, a devastating earthquake shook the country's southern peninsula, damaging hundreds of schools. Ten days later, the Foundation responded by making a commitment of US\$1M toward rebuilding educational infrastructure in the impacted areas. A call for applications was launched, and affected educational institutions had until Novem-

ber 30 to submit their requests.

Schools with applications that best reflected the Foundation's standards received field visits to confirm damage and assess feasibility. After evaluation, the project selection committee approved three schools: Collège Frères Unis de Ravine Sable, École Paul VI de Vieux-Bourg and École Congréganiste Nationale Saint-Michel de Charpentier. The Foundation's engineering team is working diligently to complete all three projects by March 2023.

In addition to its commitment to rebuilding educational infrastructure, the Foundation reviewed the 23 schools it had built in the earthquake-impacted areas. Fortunately, no major damage resulted.

Nonetheless, repairs were carried out at 21 schools to ensure their readiness in the event of another catastrophe and to reassure students that their learning spaces were safe. The Foundation's engineering team also took advantage of these interventions to include repairs required due to normal wear and tear over the years.

In parallel to working on its earthquake response, the Foundation inaugurated its three existing school construction projects, closing the 2021 - 2022 financial year with a total of 188 schools built across the country.

Ecole Nationale de Camp Coq, nearly 100 vears of History

Located in the North department, Ecole Nationale de Camp Coq is one of the oldest schools in the country. Indeed, founded in 1925, it is the first national school located in the communal section of Camp Coq and the cradle from which many personalities prospered. After years of operations, the school urgently needed new classrooms and renovations to guarantee students appropriate learning conditions. Fritz Saint-Louis, a former student, living in the United States who wanted to see his hometown flourish, submitted the construction application. Unfortunately, he passed away from Covid-19 before the inauguration on August 26, 2021.

The Colm Delves Building at Institution Mixte Notre Dame de l'Assomption

The Foundation staff invested lots of time and energy in finding an exceptional school construction project to dedicate to Colm Delves, former Digicel Group Board Director and Group CEO. Upon his passing in 2020, Denis O'Brien, Foundation Patron and owner of Digicel, said, "Colm Delves was a great man, a great leader - there is no doubt about this - but what defined him, and what we will miss most, was his kindness, compassion, and humanity."

Colm Delves left his mark wherever he went, and Haiti was no exception. He and his wife Paula financed one of the first schools built by the Digicel Foundation in 2007, Centre Communautaire Perpétuel Secours, located in Jeremie. After hurricane Matthew ravaged the south of Haiti in 2016, the Delves family again supported the school by paying for the repairs.

Institution Mixte Notre Dame de l'Assomption turned out to be the perfect match. Located only five minutes away from our offices, the school run by the Montfort Missionaries had been in desperate need of reconstruction since the 2010 earthquake. Today a beautiful nine-classroom building is named after Colm Delves, and two pre-existing structures on the site were fortified to accommodate additional classrooms, a library, a canteen, and an administration. The more than 200 students that attend Institution Mixte Notre Dame de l'Assomption are thrilled with their new premises, inaugurated on September 30, 2021.

188th School Inaugurated in Carice on Digicel Foundation's 15th Anniversary

Education is a fundamental right every child should enjoy, and the Digicel Foundation takes pride in ensuring that children living in the remotest parts of Haiti benefit from its school construction program. Therefore, it seemed most appropriate to celebrate the Foundation's 15th anniversary on March 7, 2022, with a school inauguration in Carice, a small town in the Northeast department located more than 250 kilometers from Port-au-Prince. A pillar in the Carice community, Centre Éducatif Congréganiste Mon Foyer is operated by Foie et Joie, a non-profit organization dedicated to providing education in marginalized areas. The Foundation intervened at their campus dedicated to early childhood education by building five classrooms, an administration, and sanitary facilities.

Construction Grants to Two Special Projects

The Digicel Foundation collaborated with organizations to complete two schools. Firstly, US\$27,575 was granted to Reunion Sportive d'Haiti for constructing a three-classroom kindergarten in Roche Jabouin. In 2011, the Foundation built an elementary school in this city, but no kindergarten existed. Since September 2021, dozens of young students have been enjoying their new school.

Secondly, in partnership with Haven, the Foundation invested approximately US\$64,000 toward completing Lycee Sylvio Claude on Ile à Vache. Finished at the beginning of 2022, this establishment is currently the only public high school on the island. Previously, students had no choice but to be separated from their families to attend a public secondary school in Les Cayes.
















MAP OF OUR 188 SCHOOLS

n collaboration with the Ministry of Education, the Digicel Foundation, through PARCCSEQ (Support Project for Capacity Building of School Communities for Quality Education), encourages the direct involvement of communities in their schools. The Foundation's program coordinator and 14 trainers have worked assiduously with the 68 participating schools to set up and train participatory structures at all school levels: class, teacher, and parent

Selected members of these committees, in turn, form the school board, which is responsible for assisting with the school's management, and elaborating a development plan outlining the priorities that need addressing to improve education quality and institutional sustainability.

Haiti's economic situation has deteriorated over the years, making it more difficult for parents to pay their children's tuition. In parallel, the inability to respond effectively to operational costs is one

of the main challenges that schools face. To help palliate this situation, once board members demonstrate strong leadership and management skills, trainers help them in identifying and creating a social enterprise to generate additional funds for their school. The Digicel Foundation finances the creation of these revenue-generating projects, managed by board members.

For the first two years, PARCCSEQ was very challenging to implement due to rampant social unrest forcing schools to close, followed by the pandemic, which led to the same. Thankfully, over the past twelve months, the project progressed by leaps and bounds.

At the close of the fiscal year, more than 550 committees were active at different levels, with over 3,000 members and 67 schools had renewed their boards with 557 members. Additionally, 57 of the school boards had already received

funding for their revenue-generating projects, an investment of approximately twenty-four million gourdes. Thirty projects, which range from goat raising, cosmetic stores, and castor oil production, are already beginning to see profits.

After visiting several participating schools throughout the year and witnessing the project's results first-hand, representatives from the Ministry of Education were very impressed with the results and encouraged the Foundation to share its learnings with other organizations working in education.

Often undervalued, teaching is a challenging profession requiring dedication and passion. So it is with great pride I receive the distinction of national teacher of the year for 2021 (PWONA), a P4H initiative supported by the Digicel Foundation. Given the program's transparent and rigorous application process, I am convinced that each nominated teacher and each finalist are also filled with pride and will continue to shine. A special thank you to P4H and the Digicel Foundation for valuing education and, more importantly, the teaching profession.

Quality education requires a variety of components: adequate infrastructure, an engaged school community, a responsible administration, and above all, a trained and dedicated teaching staff. The Digicel Foundation is committed to participating in initiatives promoting these learning fundamentals.

Thus when asked by P4H to support their organization's campaign to recognize Haiti's best teachers entitled PWONA (Pwofesè Nasyonal Ane a or National Teacher of the Year), the Digicel Foundation responded, absolutely yes! Like P4H, an education-focused non-profit, the Digicel Foundation believes that teaching is one of the most important professions in Haiti and that teachers should be valued and celebrated for their contributions to society.

The different stages of the annual PWONA campaign include teacher nominations, applications, interviews, and classroom observations. Following this process, the jury selects a winner per department and one overall winner for the country. Representatives from many educational institutions in Haiti and abroad participate in the selection process of these ten national winners, including Université de Quisqueya, Université Internationale d'Hispaniola, and the University of Florida.

the fifth edition of the Digicel Foundation's Konbit Pou Chanjman campaign.
Launched for the first time in 2017 to celebrate its 10th anniversary, Konbit Pou Chanjman has become an annual campaign through which the Foundation provides financing for community projects across Haiti. Indeed, since 2017, a total of 91 community projects have been implemented, benefitting thousands of people.

The fifth edition was especially successful, with 591 applications received by the July 31, 2021 deadline. Organizations with the best submissions received field visits, enabling the Foundation team to better evaluate the short-listed projects. After, the Foundation invited the 32 finalist organizations to Port-au-Prince to pitch their projects in front of the Konbit

Pou Chanjman jury and receive governance training.

Well aware of the hardship caused by the August 14 earthquake and the resulting humanitarian crisis, the jury decided to finance all of the finalist projects from the Nippes, South, and Grande-Anse departments. Therefore, the Foundation funded 22 projects versus the 15 initially planned for a total of 22 million gourdes, or one million gourdes per winning project

In parallel, this year, the 17 winning organizations from the campaign's fourth edition implemented their projects under the sustained supervision of the Foundation team. Regarding funding, the Foundation considers projects within six categories: education, livelihoods, culture, access, inclusion, and disaster prevention.

Throughout the five editions, livelihoods has proven to be the most popular category with applications for animal husbandry, fishing, beekeeping, agriculture, and agricultural transformation. Nonetheless, the Foundation has also received and financed more unique projects in areas such as marine animal protection (Haiti Ocean Project Foundation), and the training of youth in the production of pottery (Odette Roy Fombrun Foundation).


he Digicel Foundation was founded on the simple premise that wherever Digicel grows, our communities must grow too. This philosophy also extends to the company's employees! Staff Engagement is one of the Foundation's four pillars, with a dedicated program designed to empower Digicel employees to get involved in their respective communities. To facilitate their participation, the company affords employees a minimum of one paid day off annually to volunteer in the Foundation's activities.

The 2022 financial year was no exception! On multiple occasions, the Digicel Foundation stepped in to assist.

Covid-19

In June 2021, when Covid-19 cases were rising and the need for oxygen became more critical, the Digicel Foundation granted US\$50,000 to Hôpital Saint-Luc to increase their inventory. Additionally, Hôpital Universitaire de Mirebalais received 50 oxygen cylinders and ten regulators.

August 14, 2021 Earthquake

Given the number of injuries resulting from the earthquake, the Digicel Foundation donated US\$50,000 to Hôpital Saint Boniface to support their emergency medical relief efforts.

Also, with so many persons left without shelter, the Digicel Foundation purchased 20 prefabricated houses for highly vulnerable families selected by Little Footprints Big Steps.

In the Grande-Anse, the Foundation collaborated with GOAL to strengthen fishing associations affected by the earthquake. Association members received coaching to help re-establish their businesses and assistance in replacing lost or damaged equipment



Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Digicel Haiti Foundation (the Foundation), which comprise the balance sheet as at March 31, 2022, and the statements of income and expenses, changes in fund balance and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

DIGICEL HAITI FOUNDATION Notes to Financial Statements

1) ORGANIZATION

"Fondation Digicel Haiti" (Digicel Haiti Foundation: the Foundation) is a private, non-profit organization founded by Mr. Denis O'Brien. The official authorization and bylaws of the Foundation were registered at the Mayor's office in Pétionville on February 27, 2007 and published in Le Moniteur on April 3, 2008. The objectives of the Foundation are to promote community programs in Haiti that embrace and reflect the educational, social and cultural aspirations of the community. The majority of projects funded address community needs, encourage volunteerism and civic engagement, promote leadership with integrity, promote opportunities for marginalized groups, and include tangible products such as school buildings.

Although the Foundation has a vast range of objectives, it has a special focus on two areas: education and sustainability. The focus on education arises from a fundamental need across the country to increase access to quality education. The education area includes construction / repairs of schools and training (note 11). Sustainability of each project funded is the utmost importance to the Foundation prior to taking on new projects as they seek to assist communities towards self-sufficency as opposed to dependence on continued assistance.

Furthermore, to achieve these objectives, the Foundation, through direct cash and non-cash contributions (note 11), works alongside and through structured community organizations to ensure the smooth implementation of projects. The Foundation works with Governmental and non-Governmental Organizations throughout Haiti. The funds disbursed by the Foundation are grants that the receiving organizations will not be required to repay; however, the beneficiaries are required to keep and present accurate records on how all funds are utilized.

The operations of the Foundation are funded primarily by contributions from Unigestion Holding S.A. (Digicel Haiti), a related party.

The registered office of the Foundation is located at Unigestion Holding S.A. (Digicel Haiti) in Turgeau, Haiti.

2) BASIS FOR FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PREPARATION

(a) Accounting framework

The financial statements are prepared in conformity with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

These financial statements were approved by the CEO on June 15, 2022.

BASIS FOR FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PREPARATION (CONTINUED)

(b) Basis of measurement

These financial statements are presented on a historical cost basis, using the accrual basis of accounting.

The fair value of the financial assets and liabilities is practically equal to their cost.

(c) <u>Currency presentation</u>

The functional currency of the Foundation is the Haitian Gourde but at the request of Management, the financial statements are presented in US Dollars.

(d) Use of estimates and judgment

In preparing these financial statements, Management must make estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and the presentation of contingent assets and liabilities, and the income and expenses of the year. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed continuously. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in future periods affected. Although these estimates are based on Management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may differ from those estimates.

The most significant financial statements accounts affected by estimates and assumptions are:

Note 6 Accounts receivable – impairment provision

Note 8 Fixed assets – depreciation

Balance Sheet Construction materials – valuation and obsolescence.

According to Management, the financial statements were prepared on an adequate basis using fair judgment in all material respects and in accordance with the accounting policies summarized below.

2) BASIS FOR FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PREPARATION (CONTINUED)

(e) Covid-19

On March 11, 2020, the world Health Organization declared that Covid-19 had reached the stage of a global pandemic. Due to te increased uncertainty resulting from the unprecedented nature of the pandemic, the level of complexity associated with developing reliable estimates and exercising judgment has increased even further.

Haiti has been affected by this pandemic which has increased economic pressure and contributed to increasing political instability. In 2022, the Digicel Foundation has been affected by the interruptions caused by this pandemic and its compliance with social distancing, curfews, insecurity and limits on the number of participants in various events. In 2022, Management has maintainedsafety and health measures for its staff.

In 2022, the Foundation's activities continued during the pandemic.

3) SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

(a) Conversion of foreign currencies

Transactions denominated in currencies other than the functional currency (Gourde) are recorded in the functional currency at the actual exchange rates existing at the dates of the transactions.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in currencies other than the functional currency are reported at the exchange rates prevailing at year-end. Any unrealized gain or loss arising from a change in exchange rates subsequent to the date of the transaction is included as foreign exchange gain or loss in the statement of income and expenses.

3) SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(a) Conversion of foreign currencies (continued)

The presentation currency is the US dollar. In accordance with IAS 21, the results and financial position of the Foundation expressed in the functional currency are translated into the presentation currency as follows:

- Assets and liabilities for each balance sheet presented, are translated at the closing rate at the date of each balance sheet;
- Net assets other than income (deficit) for the year are translated at yearend exchange rates;
- Income and expenses for each income statement are translated at average exchange rates.

All resulting exchange differences are recognized as a "translation adjustment", a separate component of net assets.

(b) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are cash on hand and current bank accounts which are readily convertible into cash without notice. These are reflected at cost.

(c) Accounts receivable

Accounts receivable mainly include accounts receivable from contractors to whom the Foundation sells perfiles **note 3d**). Taking into account of the short duration of these receivables and their history, no provision for expected credit losses, as prescribed by IFRS 9, is required for these accounts receivable.

(d) Construction materials

Contruction materials are recorded at cost (first in – first out) and represent a reserve of metal perfiles, a frequently used material, difficult to find in Haiti. They are sold to contractors as needed.

3) SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(e) <u>Contributions</u>

Contributions to the Foundation represent cash and non-cash donations. Income from these donations is recognized when the conditions related to the transfer of assets from the contributor to the Foundation are met, otherwise it is presented as deferred income.

Cash contributions from Unigestion Holding S.A. (Digicel Haiti) represent contributions received or receivable in cash from that company in Haiti.

Other cash contributions are provided by several international donors.

Contributions received for charges to be recorded in future years are deferred until the year where the related charges are incurred.

Non-cash contributions are recorded as income when received, at their estimated fair market value by the Foundation.

f) Funding of projects and advances to contractors

A contractual framework surrounds each construction / renovation of school project. Per the terms of the contract, specific phases of work are identified and give rise to payments to the contractors.

Payments made are recorded as advances to contractors on projects. During the year, as projects progress, the related liability is set up with a corresponding charge to the funding of projects expenses; and, later on, when projects are closed, the advances are eliminated against the liability.

Expenses for grants are expensed when the disbursements are approved with the exception of grants made for the construction of schools that are treated as described above.

(q) Income taxes

Due to its legal status, Digicel Haiti Foundation is exempt from income taxes.

4) FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

Liquidity risk

Digicel Haiti provides most of the liquidity of the Foundation. The Foundation evaluates its ability to meet its obligations on an ongoing basis. Based on these evaluations, the Foundation devises budgetary strategies to manage liquidity risk.

Credit risk

Cash and cash equivalents are kept at a large local bank. Management does not believe there is a risk of non-performance by that bank.

Accounts receivable are closely monitored and impairment provision is created whenever necessary. The net amount receivable is considered to be a low credit risk.

Advances to contractors for projects and to suppliers are with reputable contractors and Management believes there is no significant impairment risk thereon. If required, an impairment provision is recognized.

Foreign exchange risk

Foreign exchange risk results from inappropriate matching between the assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies, which could lead to a long or short position impacted by the fluctuation of the Haitian gourde versus those foreign currencies.

At March 31, 2022 and 2021, the Foundation respectively maintains long positions in US dollars of \$ 275,339 and \$ 111,526. For each variation of one gourde versus the US dollar, the position in US dollars would result in an exchange gain or loss of approximately \$ 2,601 in 2022 and \$ 1,426 in 2021.

4) FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT (CONTINUED)

Operational risk

Management has put in place procedures to ensure that all constructions/renovation of schools are in line with the estimates and that all disbursements are properly authorized and well documented.

Qualified engineers, working at Digicel Haiti Fondation, regularly inspect the construction sites to ensure that the construction plans are followed, and not only in terms of the quality of the materials used but also in terms of the competence of the workers and of meeting the deadlines.

Also, proformas are obtained whenever possible and all checks need two signatures from top Management, including the CEO, when the payment is \$ 100,000 or more. Between \$ 100,000 and \$ 50,000, the CEO or the Finance Manager may sign with a member of top Management. Under \$ 50,000, the CEO may sign with the Finance Manager. Finally, adequate segregation of duties combined with restricted access to the accounting system contributes to minimizing operational risk. The accounting system is also designed to produce reports on a timely basis.

12) HAVEN COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

As part of the closure of the Haven Fondation's operations in Haiti, the Digicel Foundation has agreed to distribute the residual funds of the latter to selected beneficiaries with whom the Haven Community Fondation has previously collaborated. As of March 31, 2021, a total of \$ 217,277 had been paid and deferred income of \$ 89,723 was provided.

14) KONBIT POU CHANJMAN

The Fourth edition of Konbit Pou Chanjman was launched in June 2020 with for objective to grant 15 local organizations an amount of G 1,000,000 each, for the implementation of a community project. For this edition, 17 winning organizations were selected, instead of the 15 originally planned, for a total of G 17,000,000.

The Fifth edition was launched in May 2021 with the goal still to grant 15 local organizations an amount of G 1,000,000 each, for the implementation of a community project. Following the earthquake of August 14th of 2021, a commitment was made to increase the number of subsidies in the impacted areas. 22 winning organizations have been selected, and were announced in March through ceremonies held in regions. In the next fiscal year, installments will begin in accordance with the terms of the contract. As of March 31, 2022, 40% of this amount was provided for G 8,800,000 (US\$ 83,889 **note 9**).

The expenses related to this initiative are distributed mainly in the following activities: advertising costs in order to encourage organizations to submit grant applications, field visits to meet the organizations selected for the second phase, stays of the finalists in Portau-Prince, holding of the ceremonies as well as the supervision and evaluation of previous projects. In 2022 and 2021, as part of this initiative, the expenses incurred were respectively of US\$ 161,902 and US\$ 101,583. Costs in 2022 have increased mainly because the finalists had to be flown to Port-au-Prince due to road safety issues, signs were installed on the project sites and finally because the field agents dedicated to this campaign were active for 12 months in contrast to the previous year where they had worked only five months.

15) COMMITMENTS

As of March 31, 2022, the Foundation has committed US\$ 229,661 related to the completion of school constructions.
