

## SOTT NATIONAL GAMES



Annually, the Special Olympics Trinidad and Tobago (SOTT) hosts its National Games to promote inclusion, empowerment, and athletic excellence among persons with intellectual disabilities. The competitive events took place over a month at varying venues throughout Trinidad and Tobago. The athletes competed in 7 disciplines – football, basketball, equestrian, aquatics, athletics, bocce, and powerlifting.

As the athletes showcase their individual and team skills at the **National Games**, it presents an opportunity to shortlist the contingent to participate in the **Special Olympics World Games**, which takes place bi-annually.

## NATIONAL THERAPEUTIC AND RESOURCE CENTRE






The National Therapeutic and Resource Centre (NTRC) is a multidisciplinary resource centre which offers therapy and rehabilitation for persons with disabilities. The Digicel Foundation joined forces with the Ministry of Social Development and Family Services, to fund equipment for physical therapy, occupational therapy, behavioural and speech therapy. These resources will outfit the Adult Therapy Gym and Paediatric Therapy Gym. The funding will also cover furniture for an Adult Daily Living suite and computer equipment and accessories for an NGO Resource Room.

The Digicel Foundation invested over TT\$400,000 (US\$59,259) in this phase of the public-private sector partnership.

# EXTRAORDINARY PROJECTS IMPACTING COMMUNITIES



## What an EPIC year for new partnerships!

The Digicel Foundation teamed up with Shell Trinidad and Tobago to offer TT\$1 million (US\$148,148) in grant funding to 10 NGOs. Partners used the funding to implement EPIC projects which fell within three focus areas – Agriculture, Environment and Renewable Energy. After nine years, there are now 150 EPIC projects in T&T with an investment of TT\$7.2 million (US\$1.1 million) directly impacting 88,000 persons.

## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT HELP.EMPOWER.REINVENT



At the Digicel Foundation we remain committed to supporting and empowering women and youth in vulnerable situations. Through a partnership with the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, we provided TT875,000 (US129,630) in funding to install tech labs at New Life Ministries Rehabilitation Centre for women, Tabitha's Home for Women and Children and Is There Not a Cause (ITNAC). The collaboration will also fund upgrades to residential suites at Tabitha's Home in Tobago and the development of an Outreach Centre in downtown Port of Spain for ITNAC. The project - HER - is meant to Help Empower Reinvent women and youth in vulnerable situations. These projects are essentially developing safe and supportive environments while creating opportunities for women and youth as they navigate through life's challenges.

In Trinidad and Tobago, we celebrated World Steel Pan Day with a bang! The Digicel Foundation announced to the media and stakeholders that an investment of TT\$540,000 (US\$80,000) will go toward the development of tech centres at eight pan yards - Pandemonium, Trinidad All Stars, Valley Harps, NLCB Fonclaire, Curepe Scherzando, T&TEC Tropical Angel Harps, NGC Couva Joylanders and Katzenjammers in Tobago. Each pan yard received five computers, a printer, desks, chairs and 1 year free high speed broadband internet from Digicel+.

This intervention brings us one step closer to our objective to bridge the digital divide and increase access to the internet and technology, for youth and marginalised communities.



## Independent auditor's report

To the Board of Directors of Digicel Trinidad & Tobago Foundation

## Our opinion

In our opinion, the special purpose financial statements of Digicel Trinidad & Tobago Foundation (the Foundation) are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 2 to the special purpose financial statements.

#### What we have audited

The Foundation's special purpose financial statements comprise:

- the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2024;
- the statement of income and expenditure for the year then ended;
- the statement of changes in equity for the year then ended;
- the statement of cash flows for the year then ended; and
- the notes to the special purpose financial statements, which include significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

## **Basis for opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the special purpose financial statements* section of our report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

#### Independence

We are independent of the Foundation in accordance with the *International Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (including International Independence Standards) issued by the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants (IESBA Code).* We have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the *IESBA Code*.

## Emphasis of Matter - Basis of accounting and restriction on distribution and use

We draw attention to Note 2 to the special purpose financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The special purpose financial statements are prepared to assist the board of directors in meeting the requirements of the Non-Profit Organisations Act, 2019. As a result, the special purpose financial statements may not be suitable for another purpose.

Our report is intended solely for Digicel Trinidad & Tobago Foundation and should not be distributed to or used by parties other than Digicel Trinidad & Tobago Foundation. Our opinion is not modified in respect to this matter.

## Responsibilities of management and those charged with governance for the special purpose financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of these special purpose financial statements in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 2 to the special purpose financial statements, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of special purpose financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the special purpose financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Foundation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Foundation's financial reporting process.

## Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the special purpose financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the special purpose financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these special purpose financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the special purpose financial statements,
  whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and
  obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of
  not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error,
  as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of
  internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures
  that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the
  effectiveness of the Foundation's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Foundation to cease to continue as a going concern.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

## Notes to the Special Purpose Financial Statements 31 March 2024

(Expressed in Trinidad and Tobago dollars)

#### 1 General information

The Foundation was incorporated in the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago on 4 May 2007 as a non-profit entity and its registered office is situated at 11C Maraval Road, Port of Spain.

#### Purpose

The business of the Foundation is registered as the following:

To provide funding to individuals and organisations involved in the following:

- a. Activities of a patriotic, philanthropic, charitable, educational, artistic, social and / or sporting nature; and
- b. Activities designed to effect positive changes in communities.

All activities along this line were started by the Foundation at the beginning of the 2014 financial year.

## **Funding**

The primary source of funding for the Foundation is from donations made by Digicel (Trinidad & Tobago) Limited.

### 2 Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these special purpose financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented.

#### a. Basis of preparation

These special purpose financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost basis and are expressed in Trinidad and Tobago dollars.

#### b. Foreign currency translation

#### (i) Functional and presentation currency

The Foundation's "functional and presentation currency" is Trinidad and Tobago dollars, which is the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Foundation operates.

## (ii) Foreign currency transactions

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the date of the transactions. Foreign currency exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at year-end average exchange rates are recognised in the statement of income and expenditure.

#### c. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are carried in the statement of financial position at cost. For the purposes of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and at hand.

## 2 Significant accounting policies (continued)

#### d. Taxation

The Foundation is an approved charitable organisation and does not earn income from trade or from donations under covenant. The Foundation therefore does not earn any taxable income.

## e. Sundry payables

Sundry payables are obligations on the basis of normal credit terms and do not bear interest. They are accounted for on an accruals basis.

#### f. Income

The Foundation's primary source of income is from corporate donations received from the Digicel Group of companies, and from restricted and unrestricted grants received from national and international non-profit organisations. The Foundation recognises these donations and or grants as income when received.


